We promote, plan, build and maintain the Ice Age Trail from Fond du Lac County to the Eastern Terminus in Sturgeon Bay.

WALK THE TRAIL ALONG OUTCROPPINGS OF THE NIAGARA ESCARPMENT present and former Lake Michigan shorelines, the crest of eskers, and the edges of bogs, rolling uplands, river valleys and marshes, hilltop remnants of prairie oak, maple beech forest and the occasional urban stretch of trail that passes through many vibrant communities

Explore a Landscape

SCULPTED BY ICE AND WATER More than 12,000 years ago, an immense flow of glacial ice sculpted a landscape of remarkable beauty Some of the best evidence of this glacier is found right here in Wisconsin! The route of the Ice Age National Scenic Trail traces the glaciers edge, meandering for one thousand miles through unique glacial features, forests, prairies, lakes and rivers.

The Ice Age Trail began in the 1950's with an idea by the late Ray Zilmer of Milwaukee: to develop an Ice Age Glacier National Forest Park in Wisconsin that would follow along the entire edge of the last glacies

Ray's idea led to the creation of a nine unit Ice Age National Scientific Reserve in 1964 and National Scenic Trail designation in 1980.

Henry was the grandson of John Schuette Jr. - who sold his interest in the company store in 1884 to found the Manitowoc Savings Bank and the Oriental Mills.

THE SCHUETTE LEGACY

HENRY SCHUETTE (1903-1981)

Welcome to Henry Schuette Park

Henry's great grandfather John Schuette, a German

immigrant, opened the first company store in 1849

when Manitowoc county was just being settled and Wisconsin had recently received statehood.

The small store was "built between stumps and...

Schuette Park.

In 1978 the Schuette family donated this land to the city of Manitowoc: 65 acres of rolling hills and forests along the river. Today, we know it as Henry

After his father's retirement, Henry became president of the bank in 1947 at the age of 44.
